## Message from the President

One of the roles of the team manager is to coordinate fundraising for travel expenses. For many teams, these efforts take place all year round. Hopefully your team is well organized and assists the manager with this unrelenting task.

A frequently asked question is whether or not individuals or companies can sponsor a team or an individual player, and get the tax deduction. The answer is no. Because we are a non-profit 501c3 organization, we MUST follow the IRS rules; or face serious consequences. I know many of you have children playing other sports and they seem to get away with it. Either they are not a 501c3 organization, or they truly are getting away with it. The HSC Bulls will not be compromised with well intentioned but misguided generosity. Individuals can donate to the club, and these monies will be put in the general fund to offset costs for the travelling staff. Donations can be made to a team or an individual out of the goodness of one's heart, but this cannot be declared as a donation according to IRS rules. We appreciate your understanding here.

We often also get asked if the funds raised can be used for anything other than travel, i.e. uniforms, backpacks, local tournament fees. If the donations were given or the money raised with the explicit understanding that the team was using the money

to travel, it must be used only for travel (team vans, food, tournament entry fee, etc.).

Many fundraising events require an insurance policy to protect the company offering services and to protect our organization from fraud or injury. Car washes, food sales at malls especially insist on coverage. Team managers can obtain an insurance certificate through HYSA by emailing Ginger Matayoshi at [Ginger.L.Matayoshi@courts.state.hi.us](mailto:Ginger.L.Matayoshi@courts.state.hi.us). She will want the name of the Club, team gender and the name and address of the certificate holder provided by the fundraising location. The Bulls do have a contact to help you get a policy for each event. Please be aware this usually coast about \$100, so you need to budget for this when planning your events. Team managers are aware of this process, as outlined in the manager's manual.

Obviously, following the rules does make fundraising a cumbersome task. Your efforts are rewarded though by offsetting your travel costs which we appreciate are high; and by providing your team with a bonding experience which, by my experience, makes your travels much more successful.



As our teams were expected to know the tournament

rules, it was disappointing to witness many concerns about the officials in the tournament. I was glad to hear our coaches did have prior knowledge that this tournament would have the offside rule applied in every age group (unlike Oahu League for U7 and U8 divisions) and the allotted time per half would either be 20 or 25 minutes, depending on the age group. Sadly, the referees did not appear to have been briefed on these rule changes and were telling coaches the wrong information...as opposing teams were scoring goals that should have been called offside. For the sake of proper education: U11 players play with a size 4 not a size 5 ball. The substitution rule should be consistent for all teams. I believe the tournament did the right thing in instituting the offside rule for all age groups. The tournament should have done a better job of instructing





the referees in the tournament rules, especially those that were different from their regular league play.
